The 5-Paragraph Literary Essay

Introductory Paragraph:

- 1st sentence: broad sentence that connects to the topic
 - Rhetorical Question
 - Quotation from outside source
 - Your own thoughts
 - Definition
- 2nd sentence: explain sentence 1 (ie. broad sentence) in your own words
- <u>Thesis</u>: Your most important sentence!!!
 - You state the argument that you are going to be proving/ supporting for the rest of the essay
 - MUST include title of the novel (<u>underlined</u>), AND name the author
 - ***Ensure you're not writing a summary, but, rather, supporting an argument
- <u>Blueprint</u>: In a complete sentence, list your 3 supports (which will be developed in your body paragraphs)
- <u>Concluding sentence</u>: refer back to thesis

Body Paragraphs (x3): (middle point, weakest point,

strongest point)

- <u>Topic sentence</u>:
 - Transition word (first, second, third)
 - State WHAT the paragraph is going to be about and HOW it connects to the thesis
 - le. <mark>POINT</mark>
- **PROOF**: about 2 sentences
 - Introduce a quote from the text that supports this topic sentence
 - Insert quote
 - Eg. This is demonstrated in a conversation between Nick and Gatsby: "......"
 (Fitzgerald 130).
 - If you are quoting dialogue:
 : "(Fitzgerald)
 - 130-131).
 - If quoting multiple points on page:
 - : " quote quote quote [...] quote quote quote" (Fitzgerald 15).
- COMMENT: 1-2 sentences
 - Analyze
 - Explain how the quote you have provided works to support your thesis

Concluding Paragraph: mirrors intro paragraph

- Transition statement (eg. In conclusion, To Sum up)
- Restate thesis (different words than in intro)
 - Restate title (underlined)
 - Restate name of author
- Restate blueprint
- Concluding sentence: clincher
 - Rhetorical question
 - General but interesting statement that leaves your reader thinking
